If you do not have internet access, you need to find time to go somewhere where it is available (i.e., SPC campus or Public Library). The MindTap homework manager will show up-to-date grades and transfer them directly over to Blackboard too. You have 48 hours to dispute any online grades by emailing your instructor. After this time, no grades will be disputed.

TexBook > Cengage MindTap

This course is part of the SPC TexBook program, which means students don't need to purchase a textbook or access code for this course. TexBook is the required content (i.e. online Courseware) for this class and is provided for you via the Bibliu platform from Day 1 of class.

- Cost of *TexBook*: This required content is provided as part of a program called '*Inclusive Access*', which means the content is provided at the lowest price available from the publisher. Cost is included in tuition.
- How to *access your digital content* via Bibliu: Students can access material via the Bibliu link inside your Blackboard Course, or directly via the Bibliu app. If you have issues with this, please contact your instructor, the SPC Bookstore Manager, or Bibliu Support.
- The *Bibliu* platform: Enhance learning experiences, with features including: highlighting, notes, and reading text aloud. For more details and support on how to use Bibliu, please visit the <u>BibliU support pages</u> or contact Bibliu support via the email (<u>support@bibliu.com</u>).
- **Opting out**: Students can Opt-Out of the TexBook Program up until the Opt-Out deadline, via the banner displayed when you open the Bibliu platform. Remember that Opt-Out deadlines vary by term, and if you choose to Opt-Out you will lose access to this low price option, and will need to purchase the content through a different method. If you Opt-Out, the fee will be refunded to your account.

The online MindTap platform has plenty of materials to help you gain an understanding of the assigned content. Please allow yourself time to exercise these resources when working on your assignments and studying for your exams.

SPC Blackboard Ultra Portal

The Blackboard Ultra software used to manage this class monitors student logins, tracking when and where the student has been in the course. Accessing this course regularly is extremely important to meet the objectives. Ideally, students should daily check the *"Announcements"* tab in Blackboard for the most up-to-date information. Students should also frequently reference their SPC student e-mail inbox and Blackboard *"Messages"* for direct communication with the instructor.

This course is not 100% self-paced—there will be deadlines assigned at the beginning of the term. You will feel more at ease with the materials if you stay in touch with what is going on. This course is 3 semester credit hours. Students should plan to work on about one (1) full chapter per week to successfully complete the material. It is very easy to put off participation and deadlines during a hybrid course, but don't wait until the last minute.

Online Assignments

Homework is assigned to facilitate your understanding of the material. Homework is done online outside of class time and links can be found in the class Blackboard page under "*Content*." Assignments are separated as: *Unit # > Chapter #*. Due dates and material(s) availability will also be listed. We will be using MindTap to complete almost all <u>homework, quizzes, and exams</u>. Students should plan to spend **2-4 hours on each chapter**, to complete both the homework and quiz.

Electronic Assignments

Computer and/or Wi-Fi failure is not an excuse for missing assignments. Notify the instructor immediately when issues come up, but students are still responsible for meeting all deadlines.

This class will involve the use of the Internet and possibly the need to access discussion groups, forums, bulletin boards, email programs, and/or chat rooms to complete the objectives of the course. Topics assigned by the instructor will be relevant to the objectives of this class.


Course Grading Policy

Academic Course Guide Manual (ACGM): BUSI-1301

This course provides a survey of economic systems, forms of business ownership, and considerations for running a business.
